"If somebody needs help with something dealing with kids and the outdoors, I want to be there," said Dick Smith, who has been volunteering with mentoring youth in hunting and fishing programs for "at least the last 60 years."

"I think the number one thing is, you've got to like kids, and you've got to like the outdoors," he added.

Smith said he has worked with groups of people over the years that have a love for hunting and fishing that they want to instill in kids.

One of the most important of Smith's endeavors is hunter safety education.

Smith's friend Dave Donachy, a Pennsylvania Game Commission wildlife conservation officer, said sportsmen's clubs began offering volunteer safety training for hunters in 1950, and the Game Commission began with the safety education programs in 1959.

"After World War Two, there were 150 to 200 hunting incidents with 20 to 30 deaths every year until 1959, when the Game Commission came on board," Donachy said. "Last year was the safest on record."
